PURPOSE

This two-day program is the seventeenth in a continuing series addressing the educational, social, and behavioral issues pertaining to students with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD). Our purpose is to provide those who attend - educators, parents, and related professionals - with current and effective strategies for the appropriate education of the higher functioning student with Autism, Asperger's Syndrome and other Pervasive Developmental Disorders.

Dennis Debbaudt, keynote, is an Autism Training Consultant for Law Enforcement. Author of over 25 ASD related publications including: Autism, Advocates and Law Enforcement Professionals: Recognizing and Reducing Risk Situations for People with Autism Spectrum Disorders. Contributing author: Asperger Syndrome in Adolescence and Coming Out Asperger: Diagnosis, Disclosure and Self-Confidence. Video Producer: Autism and Law Enforcement. Parent of a young man with ASD

Rebekah Heinrichs, MSN, MSEd., is an educator specializing in the autism spectrum with a master's degree in both pediatric nursing and special education (with a focus on ASD). Rebekah has worked as a trained parent educator with the Parents As Teachers Program as well as a trained community facilitator with the Adults and Children Together Against Violence program. She facilitates the Asperger Information website at www.aspergerinformation.org and is the forum administrator for the discussion board, providing a medium for dialogue worldwide. Author of *Perfect Targets: Asperger Syndrome and Bullying*, she speaks nationally regarding educational, social and bullying issues.

Lynda Geller, Ph.D., is the Clinical Director for the Asperger Institute at NYU's Child Study Center. She is responsible for the development of the educational program within the Institute, which includes the Advanced Learning Lab; the clinical program; and the community support and outreach program. She served on the Medical School faculties of Georgetown and Stony Brook Universities. She served as the Executive Director of the Asperger Foundation International and is currently a Board member. She has provided continuing education, consultation, and training for educational personnel serving students on the autism spectrum. She is a frequent speaker for families and educational personnel, helping translate current research results into practical intervention strategies. Dr. Geller serves on the advisory board of AHA.

Dorothy Siegel, M.P.A., has a distinguished history in NYC special education reform. As an education researcher and project director at NYU's Institute for Education and Social Policy, her work at NYU has focused on collaborating with the NYC Department of Education and with Professor Shirley Cohen of Hunter College to develop, implement, and replicate the ASD Nest program, an inclusion program for higher functioning children on the autism spectrum. As of fall 2007, the ASD Nest Program serves close to 200 children on the spectrum in 11 neighborhood elementary schools across all five boroughs; it is also at one middle school and one high school. She was a member of Community School Board 15 and co-chaired District 15's Special Ed Task Force. The district forged new pathways in special education, including the Collaborative Team Teaching (CTT) model, which later became the NYC DOE's primary inclusion model for children with special needs.

Juliet Williams, Psy.D., is a clinical psychologist serving children with special needs and their families. She provides educational consultation to families and school districts, diagnostic evaluations, and therapeutic intervention. Dr. Williams' approach is pragmatic and user friendly. Her focus is on teaching children to become experts on how they learn and teaching them the skills they need to thrive and survive in school, at home and in the community. Through her teaching, consultation, and clinical work, she continues to hone creative and practical interventions for educators and families that target emotional dysregulation, promote adaptive behavior and foster self-advocacy.
